

Message from the Headteacher

I hope you enjoyed the half term break and were able to have quality time together with loved ones. Due to restrictions it probably felt more of a rest than it did a change, nonetheless I hope it afforded the students and you, their families an opportunity to switch off and reflect on the last half-term.

Upon our return, it has been an extremely eventful week with a great deal of information about education and schools for the school, students and parents to process and my message in this newsletter is my attempt to summarise the key points. There will be ongoing communication in the weeks ahead as more is clarified and plans are confirmed as to how to implement the proposed next steps here at Warlingham.

Firstly, I was extremely pleased to hear that we will be welcoming the students back to face to face teaching during the week commencing the 8th March. This is a great step forward and one that we very much welcome. As I shared with parents earlier this week this does include the implementation of asymptomatic testing for Covid 19 for all students on 3 occasion at school and twice weekly at home for at least the remainder of spring term. Testing is voluntary however we very much encourage students to support the return to school being as safe as possible by taking part in testing. There will be



more detailed plans outlining how, where and when the testing will take place at the start of next week. It is our intention to make a head start on the testing programme from Wednesday next week (week commencing 1st March) so please ensure that you (or your child if they are 16 or over) have completed the online consent form at the following links:

There has been a considerable amount of rhetoric in the media about the loss of learning and the need for catch up. While ensuring that students are given every opportunity to secure the key knowledge, conceptual understanding and skills they need from their secondary schooling is never far from my mind or those of the whole staff body, this is not helpful for the students to hear or subscribe to. As school leaders, teachers and school staff we are committed to a detailed analysis of any gaps in learning alongside planning our curriculum and adapting our teaching and learning approaches to ensure we do all that is needed to support the students in bouncing back from the disruption to their school experience over the past 12 months. As a parent myself, I am fully aware of how challenging it has been for students to sustain their working routines, motivation and engagement in their learning during the lockdown. Nonetheless, as we look forward to a return to face to face teaching in the near

future, the focus for the students needs to be on what they have learnt, what they have achieved and how they have developed as learners. The levels of self-directed study, nature of online live learning and the skills required to manage this learning experience are those that are not normally experienced until students are in further education, adult education or the workplace. This is a unique learning experience that they have had that will help counteract a number of the negative differences between their learning experience and those of previous students. We are committed to building on this and maximising the development of students as learners through the Warlingham learner when they return to school and throughout their remaining time at Warlingham.

You will undoubtedly be aware that as well as announcing the return to face to face schooling for all students commencing from the 8th March, the Secretary of State for Education has also outlined the plans for the awarding of qualifications to Year 11 and 13 students this week. It is wholly reassuring to know that the proposed plans seek to ensure no child is tested on content that they have not been able to be taught and that their teachers will have the flexibility to look at a broad range of evidence to reach judgements about what they are capable of and what is a fair grade. It is disappointing that instead of the focus being on how this will support the students after such a turbulent year of schooling, the emphasis is being placed on the potential for grade inflation. The commitments shared with Year 11 and 13 parents prior

to parents evenings earlier this term remain the same in light of these announcements

We are committed to supporting students in Year 11 and 13 by:

- Continuing to teach key content that provides the key knowledge, understanding for progression within the subject and more broadly for their next steps
- Supporting their development as learners and understanding how best to cement learning, memorise key information and perform under test conditions using Practice for Progress and Test Organise and Practice approaches
- Providing (as much as is possible) the opportunity to perform under test conditions

Building this into a wider assessment of their performance so that students have a number of opportunities do demonstrate their progress

Thank you again for all that you are doing in support of the students while learning remotely, for your support of the school in managing a phased return to face to face teaching as safely as possible and for reinforcing the positive learning and development of your child during lockdown.






National Careers Week 1st—6th March




Departments in Focus—English

Departments in Focus—Sixth Form Photography

During the half term The Photographers Gallery put on an online festival full of talks and workshops all to do with photography. I decided to go to the artist talk by Evgenia Arbugaeva. Evgenia is a Russian documentary photographer who focuses her work on documenting the lives of those who live in the Russian artic. During the talk she showed us some of the work she had done and talked us through her process and how she ended up with the final images that are in the collections. She explained how she would spend at least a year going back to these villages in the Russian artic and properly getting to know the people who she is taking photographs of so it felt like less of a violation to their personal autonomy. This really gave me an insight into what being a documentary photographer was like and the work that is put into each of the collections that she has created. There was also a Q&A section and this was really useful because, not only did I get to ask my own questions I had about her editing style and any advice she had for people wanting to get into a profession like this, I also got to hear other peoples opinions on the work and questions that they had to ask that hadn't even thought of. Overall I really enjoyed attending this talk and found that it really helped to make me think about what I should be doing to introduce myself into the world of photography as a job rather than just a hobby.

Departments in Focus—Sixth Form Photography

I was luckily enough to be able to take part in the Cyanotype virtual workshop with The Photographers Gallery over Zoom. Myself and twenty or so others were introduced to Emily Parris, a darkroom and cyanotype specialist. I learned of the history and origins of Cyanotypes as it was invented by Sir John Harschel, a brilliant astronomer and scientist, in 1842. He wanted to find a way to copy his notes in a pre-digital world. His work played a huge part in the development of photography. Later on, his work influenced a woman named Anna Atkins who released the first ever published photographic book titled *Photographs of British Algae: Cyanotype Impressions (1843-53).* She was a true pioneer as in her time it was rare for women to be recognised for their work.

I then learnt how to create Cyanotypes and what they are: They're a camera-less photographic printing technique which uses ultraviolet light rays to expose UV sensitive paper. You begin with two iron compounds and mix with water to create the sensitive solution (Ferric Ammonium Citrate & Potassium Ferricyanide). However, for the virtual workshop I was sent in the mail pre-coated paper to use. After we were informed of the history, the process to create one and how to create test strips as to not waste the sheets we had been given we were given a few hours to go off and complete the practical. I explored using a faux leaf and some rose petals on my two test strips. Then later explored tools on one sheet which created a nice contrast as the objects were flat against the paper. I also tried to do a rose however, that one didn't appear as well as the others given the weather wasn't at its best and the object wasn't flat

When we returned to the Zoom we shared our work to each other and spoke about each one, reflecting and commenting on each piece as a class which was a good opportunity to understand how classes may work at university.

Altogether the experience was awesome, and I couldn't have asked for a better tutor: Emily Parris. To end the workshop, she went over ways in which we could use cyanotype printing in the future, in jobs, photoshoots, editing, blueprints and advertisement and gave examples of other people's work and their development even the world's largest cyanotype print! Below is what I created as

volved with these type of things – I had no idea what a cyanotype was before the workshop and now will be keeping it in mind when creating future projects in photography.

Thank you for participating in the "bird detective challenge", specially to Ben (7W) for sending this beautiful picture of a green woodpecker.


Insects are the invisible force working throughout the world to keep it running. They return nutrients to the earth. If they weren't around, the amount of decay and rot all over the place would be terrible!








Departments in Focus—PE



Free School Meals

It is apparent that during the current COVID pandemic, some family's financial circumstances may have changed. As such and in order to provide support where we can, we are seeking to raise awareness for those that may now qualify for an entitlement to Free School Meals. The criteria are laid out below.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA 1 – DOES EITHER PARENT RECEIVE ANY OF THE FOLLOWING

Universal Credit with an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400 Income support

Income based Jobseeker's Allowance (IBJSA)

Income related Employment and Support Allowance (IRESA)

Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

The guarantee element of Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit (with no Working Tax Credit) with an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC

N.B. If you receive WORKING TAX CREDIT you do NOT qualify even if you receive child tax credit and your income is below £16,190

Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for the four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)

Children who are eligible for Free School Meals also attract additional funding in the form of Pupil Premium which is used by the school to support the child's learning.
